Oh, the lights and the sounds of the Christmas season. We begin to "Deck the halls with boughs of holly...Tis the season to be jolly...and as we Troll the ancient Yuletide (Christmas season) carol, we can strike the harp and join the chorus - so follow me in merry measure, while I tell of Yuletide treasure - so, Let us sing we joyous all together, heedless of the wind and weather - Fa la la la la, la la la la." Yes, the Christmas Advent Season is here.

I started putting up our outside Christmas decorations and lights in early November, but I did obey the unwritten rule (if there really is one) of not turning them on until after Thanksgiving. However, I do have to admit that I started listening to Christmas music well before Thanksgiving. The Christmas songs and music we all grew up with over the years have a special meaning to each of us, and both their melodies and lyrics have a familiarity that reminds us of past Christmas seasons with loved ones and friends that we shared those seasons with. I've always loved Nat King Cole's singing of "The Christmas Song" and the last verse chorus: "And so I'm offering this simple phrase, to kids from one to 92...Although it's been said many times, many ways, Merry Christmas to you."

Growing up, my parents loved to listen to the familiar Christmas songs sung by Berle Ives, the Andrews Sisters, Bing Crosby, Perry Como, Peggy Lee, Andy Williams, Dean Martin, Frank Sinatra, etc., often accompanied with the big band and orchestra sounds...and when I hear each year: "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas", "It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas", "Jingle Bells", "Frosty the Snowman", and so many others, I'm always reminded of past Christmas seasons, as well as this Christmas season that God has blessed me with. Growing up in Clayton, we would do a majority of our Christmas shopping in Watertown, and in the 1950's and 60's most of the stores were located on Public Square in downtown Watertown, with F.W. Woolworth store being the largest retailer. We also had some nice stores in Clayton, and you could place an order at one of the "catalogue" stores. Each season we would get the Sears, JC Penny, and the Montgomery Ward Catalogues sent to our house, and they were "thick." (We didn't need to work out with weights back then, because we could just bench press and arm curl those catalogues.) It sure was a different era, and when I hear the familiar Christmas carols it certainly takes me back to that time.

But amid the memories, the joy and the laughter, we also often experience a feeling of melancholy at Christmas, because everyone's not with us. We have family members, church family and friends who have either passed on, or due to other life circumstances, won't be with us this Christmas. Steven Curtis Chapman in his Christmas song, "Wonderful" not only reflects on this feeling, but also the hope found in Jesus so that we can make this Christmas truly "Wonderful." Here are the lyrics to this song:

"It's the time of year when happiness and cheer won't be enough to get me through the night. I need a Wonderful Counselor, the Mighty God, the Prince of Peace - who's strong enough to carry me - Immanuel, God with us, the one whose love will never end...Oh, Jesus, can you make the season Wonderful. Almighty in a manger, told us he'd be no stranger to all our sorrow and all the hurt we'll ever know. So let these gifts remind us, how Love came down to find us - Wonder of the ages - The Life, the Truth, the Way! For unto us a child is born (Wonderful); For unto us a Son is given (Wonderful); and He will live and He will die to conquer death and bring us life. Forever He will be our Wonderful Counselor, the Mighty God, the Prince of Peace, who's strong enough to carry me - Immanuel - God with us! The One whose love will never end - Oh, Jesus, You are ...WONDERFUL".

Oh, the Light, and the Sounds of Christmas! Now let me tell you what really brings me Joy, and Peace, and Hope during the Christmas Season: God's Word, the beautiful Christian Christmas carols that bring us into the presence of God (Worship), and the Biblical account of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. "Joy to the World", "Away in a Manger", "Hark the Herald", "O Holy Night", "Silent Night", and the list goes on. These Christmas Carols speak to the true Light of Christmas: Heaven coming to earth - Our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ, our Messiah.

"In Him was life, and that life was the Light of all mankind. The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it... Yet to all who did receive Him, to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God, children not born of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth. (John 1; 4-5, 12-14)

The True Light of Christmas is Salvation and Redemption through Jesus Christ. God loves us so much that He sent and gave us His only begotten Son, "that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but will have everlasting life." (John 3:16) Later, Jesus, in announcing His purpose in coming said this: "For the Son of man has come to seek and to save that which was lost." (Luke 19:10) This is the True Light of the Christmas season - God with us - Emmanuel - He has come for you and me.

Oh, the sounds of Christmas: Multitudes of angels rejoicing at the birth of our Savior. As we look at the Biblical narrative in Luke (Ch. 2), the Christmas Carol, "Do You Hear What I Hear?" comes to mind. But first, let's read from Luke 2, starting with vs 8: "Now there were in the same country shepherds who were abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night. And, lo, the Angel of the Lord came upon them, the glory of the Lord shone round about them; and they were greatly afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a SAVIOR (the Messiah), the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: you will find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly hosts praising God, and saving, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

The greatest event in the history of the world has just taken place here. God has taken on human form and has come for all of us to save and redeem us. "Said the little lamb to the shepherd boy: Do you hear what I hear? Ringing through the sky, shepherd boy, Do you hear what I hear? A song, a song, high above the trees with a voice as big as the sea...with a voice as big as the sea." Oh, the Sound of Christmas, and the multitude of heavenly hosts singing and praising God with a JOY and a shout of GLORY to God in the Highest, announcing the birth of the new born King! "Said the king to the people everywhere: Listen to what I say! Pray for peace, people everywhere! Listen to what I say: The Child, the Child, sleeping in the night, He will bring us goodness and light; He will bring us goodness and light." (From the carol: Do You Hear What I Hear?)

When a very pregnant Mary and her espoused husband Joseph traveled from Nazareth to Bethlehem, about 70 miles, (as was required of them to register for the census to be taken), there was no room at the Inn for them to stay. Mary then delivered and gave birth to the Christ Child where they kept the animals... in a stable... in a manger. And that child is the fulfillment of God's promise. This Child had His first cry and gone to sleep there in Bethlehem, in a manger.

This Christmas Carol speaks so beautifully to this night: "Silent Night, Holy Night, All is calm, All is bright; Round yon virgin, mother and Child; Holy infant so tender and mild; sleep in heavenly peace. Silent night, Silent night! Son of God, Love's pure light. Radiant beams from Thy holy face; With dawn of redeeming grace. JESUS, Lord at Thy Birth; JESUS, Lord at Thy birth." Another Carol that speaks to the Awe and Wonder of the virgin birth of Jesus is "What Child Is This"? especially vs 4: "This, this is Christ the King, Whom shepherds guard and angels sing; Haste, haste to bring Him laud, The Babe, the Son of Mary.

But there is another sound during the Christmas season that for me just speaks to my Spirit and I hope yours also - the Christmas Carol, "O Holy Night": "O Holy Night, the stars are brightly shining, it is the night of our dear Savior's birth. Long lay the world in sin and error pining, Til He appeared, and the soul felt its worth. A thrill of HOPE - a weary world REJOICES - FOR YONDER BREAKS A NEW AND GLORIOUS MORN (salvation and new birth)! Fall on your knees; O hear the angel voices: O NIGHT DIVINE! O NIGHT WHEN CHRIST WAS BORN! O NIGHT! O NIGHT DIVINE! Let all within us PRAISE HIS HOLY NAME"!

Oh, the Light and the Sound, and the Wonder and the Awe of Christmas!! It's found in receiving and opening the gift of Salvation and Redemption in CHRIST JESUS, OUR LORD, SAVIOR AND MESIAH. Yes, new birth. Yes, In Christ Jesus, we are HOPE BRINGERS!

"And although it's been said many times, many ways: Merry Christmas to you".

Christmas and Grief

Most people think of Christmas as a joyful time of year. Unfortunately, this is not the case with everyone. Did you know that December 25th is the peak time of year for resorts of depression and attempts at suicide?

Everyone has suffered some sort of loss and the heartache and pain that comes along with it. Research shows that people who have suffered a significant loss, whether it be the loss of a loved one, the loss of a job or the loss of health, find the holidays the hardest times to get through.

It is common for people to think of the holidays as a time to gather with family. For those who have lost someone however, the holidays are another reminder that their loved one is no longer here and a reminder of their loneliness. If the loss is recent, those grieving have to anticipate the first Christmas without their loved one. We have been taught that grieving is normal and healthy, but that does not remove the fact that it is painful. Faced with the inevitable reminder of loss that Christmas brings, many fall into depression.

There are many examples of grief and loss in the Bible. Job suffered terrible losses and asked why? Jeremiah saw and warned the people concerning the destruction of Jerusalem, but no one listened. His book of Lamentations is a long and bitter account of his grief and tears over this. Paul, pleaded with God to remove a "thorn in his flesh" to no avail. In the end he had to accept God's purpose for his suffering. Jesus offered intense prayers to God to have the agony of the cross removed, so intense that drops of blood dripped from His forehead. He then accepted God's will. (Luke 22:44)

All of these people and more experienced the pain of grief and loss. As humans our suffering is the same, and the way God ministers to us during these times is the same as well. Our trials never go unnoticed by God. God provides His constant love, (Romans 8:35-39) God comforts us. (Philippians 4:7) God is our hope. (John 16:20) And the greatest hope to those who believe and respond to Jesus with faith, expressed in repentance (Mark 16:16), have the guarantee that whatever causes grief now will be swallowed up in victory with eternal life with God.

Those of you who are finding the holiday season difficult, find your peace in Christ and reach out to your Brothers and Sisters in Christ to travel your journey by your side (Ecclesiastes 4:10). If you are blessed beyond measure this holiday season and not yourself grieving, look around you and reach out to the person who is alone and grieving this holiday season. You may be placed in their life for such a time as this.

May we all feel Christ's love and peace this holiday season.

Breaking The Chains Biblical Recovery Ministry ~ Ken & Michelle Kavanagh



When I was a child, the sights and sounds of Christmas were exciting for me. I loved winter, and still do. Even though the thought of receiving a gift was exciting, gathering with my family and watching the change in people throughout the season filled my heart and made a lasting impression with me that has stayed with me as I grew older. It seemed like, for a moment, the joy and love of Christ filled the hearts of people which gave others a measure of hope when going through difficult situations because they saw first hand the love of Christ working through people. I sometimes still think "why can't this last all year long?"

As I got older and lived life, I understood how difficult it can be to have that joyous feeling, even at Christmas time, when we are dealing with difficult situations. It wasn't until I went through some of those difficult situations did I understand how someone can feel anxious, depressed, lonely, fearful, worried and even angry. Sometimes we are struggling with illness, financial difficulties/job loss, family/marriage problems, loss of a loved one or mistreatment by others. Sometimes it could even be thoughts of something that happened long ago that we can't let go of. These emotions, if not dealt with, can turn into bitterness, hate, or lead to addiction. For some, they feel stuck, like there is no way out, and decide to end their life. Though these are not happy thoughts to read (or write) about, it may help us to be aware of those around us when we see others who are struggling or are unhappy. What we are seeing in their anger, fear, depression, or anxiety is pain, and like an infected wound that has not been treated, that wound within the heart can run deep and the pain can be unbearable and the worries can seem endless.

But praise God we have a righteous King, Jesus, who can heal the wounds and take care of our problems! He is our healer:

He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. (Psalm 147:3)

He is our Counselor:

6 For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9:6)

And He wants you to hand over your burdens and concerns so you can have that joy and peace He promises to give:

28 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. 29 Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. 30 For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

If you are struggling at this time, what is stopping you from turning your heart and problems over to Christ? It only takes a moment to sit with Him and bring it before Him, admitting you can't handle this alone and then trust that He will help you.

If you know someone who is struggling, it only takes a moment to pray for that person every time you think of them and continue reminding them when you see them that we have a Savior that will help them and heal them if they put their trust in Him.

Today, turn it all over to Christ. Today, be that light in someone's darkness and bring Christ into their situation.

Types of Disasters Part II FLOOD

Before a flood

- 1. Check out flood insurance in your area
- 2. Build an emergency kit and family communications plan
- 3. Avoid building in a floodplain unless you elevate and reinforce your home.
- 4. Elevate the furnace, water heater and electric panel in your home if you live in an area that has a high flood risk.
- 5. Consider installing "check valves" to prevent flood water from backing up into the drains of your home.
- 6. If feasible, construct barriers to stop floodwater from entering the building and seal walls in basements with waterproofing compounds.

During a flood

- 1. Listen to radio or tv for emergency information
- 2. If there is any possibility of a flash flood, move to higher ground and don't wait for instructions.
- 3. Be aware of streams, drainage channels and canyons and any other areas known to flood quickly.

If you must prepare to evacuate, do the following:

- 1. Secure your home. Bring in outdoor furniture and move essentials to an upper floor.
- 2. Turn off utilities at the main switches and valves if instructed to do so. Disconnect electrical appliances. Do not touch electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water.

If you have to leave your home, remember these evacuation tips:

- 1. Do not walk through moving water. Six inches of moving water can make you fall. If you have to walk in water, walk where the water is not moving. Use a stick to check the firmness of ground in front of you.
- 2. Do not drive into flooded areas. If floodwaters rise around your car, abandon the car and move to higher ground if you can do so safely. You and the vehicle can be swept away quickly.
- 3. Do not camp or park your vehicle along streams, rivers or creeks, particularly during threatening conditions.

After the Flood

Your home has been flooded. Although floodwaters may be down in some areas, many dangers still exist. Here are some things to remember in the days ahead:

- Flash floods can occur. Use local alerts and warning systems to get information and expert informed advice as soon as available.
- Avoid moving water.
- Stay away from damaged areas unless your assistance has been specifically requested by police, fire, or relief organization.
- Emergency workers will be assisting people in flooded areas. You can help them by staying off the roads and out of the way.
- Return home only when authorities indicate it is safe.
- Be aware of areas where floodwaters have receded. Roads may have weakened and could collapse under the weight of a car.
