Happy February, River Church! In 1 Corinthians 16:14, we read:

Your every action must be done with love.

Such a short statement to have so heavy a call! Think about what is being said here. First of all, notice that this is a command, not a suggestion. When Paul writes to the Christians of Corinth, he is conveying that God expects them to act with love and to keep acting with love. This wasn't a once and done deal; Paul was telling them to make it a pattern of behavior: when they acted, it was to be done with love.

Notice also that this is a personal call to action. Paul didn't say, "their every action must be done with love." Those who hear the words of this letter are meant to take this command personally: Your every action must be done with love.

So, it's a command, it's personal, and then notice that it is universal. There are no actions that aren't to be done with love; instead, every action must be done with love. If you are a person who likes clear rules with no room for exceptions, this is just such a rule. In a sense, this makes it easier because we don't have to stop and think about what our motive should be in each situation—it should always be love.

To actually put this into practice, though, can be difficult. It may require examining our motives when we act. It may require changing what we do or how we speak so our actions and words reflect love. It may require praying for a changed heart toward a person or situation. It may require choosing to act with love even if we don't feel very loving.

But to act with love is what we are called to do. That word for "love," agapē in the Greek, is not based on an emotion or feeling, by the way, although an emotion or feeling of love may be present. Instead, it is a willful determination to put the welfare of others above our own. In other words, it is a sincere concern for the good of another. This kind of love is a fruit of the Spirit, meaning the Holy Spirit enables believers to love in this way (Galatians 5:22-23). When we do everything with love, we are imitating our Savior Jesus (Ephesians 5:1-2). And it is this kind of love that helps followers of Christ work together in unity (Colossians 3:14).

February is the month that stores tell us we need to buy cards, flowers, and candy for one another as a sign of our love. But what if instead of buying things, we as Christians lived out the command of "every action must be done with love" year-round? It would not only be a way to show who Jesus is to the world but also a way to show who we are because of Jesus—a people formed out of the love of God who can love because He first loved us.

So, River Church, go forth, love one another, and let all that you do be done with love.

Saying yes to reading the entire Bible is the beginning of a commitment to draw near to Jesus, with intention and consistency. It is best to set aside a time that you can devote yourself to focus and concentrate on it. No other god desires this closeness with his servants. Are we are not mere slaves in servitude to our Lord, who paid the ultimate price for us? He doesn't call us servants, He calls us brothers n sisters. He calls us child of the most high King.

We must remember that the length of our days are decided by God and only God, we cannot change what He puts into place.

"Your eyes have seen my unformed substance; and in your book were written ALL the days that were ordained for me, when yet there were not one of them." Psalm 139:16

Blueberry Streusel Muffins

1/4 cup butter, softened
1/3 cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 tsp vanilla
2 1/3 cup flour
4 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
1 cup milk

1 1/2 cup fresh or frozen blueberries or mixed fruit

Streusel
1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup flour
1/2 tsp cinnamon
1/4 cup cold butter

In large bowl, cream butter and sugar. Beat in eggs and vanilla; mix well. Combine the four, baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Fold in blueberries.

Fill 12 greased or paper lined muffin cups 1/2 full. In small bowl combine sugar, flour and cinnamon; cut in butter until crumbly. Sprinkle over muffins. Bake at 375 for 25-30 minutes or until browned. Cool for 5 minutes before moving to a wire rack. Serve warm. Excellent nice and fluffy muffins!

Note: If using frozen berries, no need to thaw before adding to batter.
